

6. In recent months, Judge Garza's behavior has become increasingly erratic. He is paranoid all of the time, and is of the opinion that everyone is out to get him. He has also been subject to frequent mood swings. He is constantly up and down while on the bench; we cannot get him to stay on the bench. On June 27, 2006, for instance, in the middle of a sentencing, he just got up and left the bench. This was witnessed by A.D.A Jill Johnson and later reported to me by Kristin Davis, a Judicial Specialist. It was also on this date that Ms. Davis reported him belittling her in the courtroom in front of attorneys and defendants.
7. Judge Garza acts in a manner consistent with someone addicted to cocaine. He has the reputation in the court of being a party guy, a real party animal. He has associated himself with individuals who are known drug users.
8. In December 2005, I found Lauren Spilsbury walking around in the restricted (non-public) area of the courthouse. She said that she was "looking for Carlos." A few weeks later while in the Civil division (which is housed elsewhere), Lauren Spilsbury came into the clerks' area asking where Carlos was. After she was informed that he was not at the Civil court by Patsy Quiorga, a Judicial Specialist, I followed her outside and informed her that she must use the public entrance at all times and is not allowed in any restricted areas at either courthouse.
9. On July 13, 2006, Judge Chandler and I met with Judge Garza regarding recent complaints from various Magistrate Court clerks. Judge Chandler advised Judge Garza that if he wanted to discuss any of the complaints with any of the complaining parties, Judge Garza should do so in the presence of Judge Frietze or me. The following day, July 14, 2006, Judge Garza pulled aside Kristin Davis and Laurie Boylston, two Judicial Specialists. His conversation with those clerks was not conducted in the presence of either Judge Frietze or me.
10. On July 17, 2006, Judge Garza had a complaint about a file that Marie Arenas, Judicial Leadworker, had handled, which he addressed with me. After discussing the issue on the case, Judge Garza also said, "Well, if these clerks are going to get me in trouble, I am going to do the
