In 2002, Rod Adair filed a constitutional amendment to ban New Mexico's taxpayer funded legislative retirement system. (Source: SJR 18 by Adair, 2002 Legislative Session)

The next year, Adair even said the current retirement system was against the New Mexico Constitution, which bans compensation and perks to state lawmakers.

"I don't see any way in the world it's not a perk," Adair said.

Rod Adair didn't change Santa Fe, Santa Fe changed him:



In 2005, Adair voted for a bill that would have jumped legislator retirement by 17%, - making Adair eligible for pension of \$287,000 over the next 20 years. The bill was so lucrative Governor Richardson vetoed it.
